Professor Shima Kaimom Gyoh

Professor Gyoh is a Professor of Surgery at the new College of Health Sciences, Benue State University, Makurdi, Benue State, Nigeria. He received his medical degree in 1966 from University of Newcastle upon Tyne in England. His long and industrious career has spanned over 45 years both in the UK and Nigeria. He was appointed Chief Medical Director of the Jos University

Teaching Hospital in 1984 and between 1988 and 1994; he was Director-General of the Federal Ministry of Health. He returned to clinical practice and in 2003 and was appointed Chairman of the Medical and Dental Council of Nigeria and Chairman of the Medical & Dental Practitioners' Disciplinary Tribunal between 2004 and 2008. He is on the Board of two non-profit organisations that work to improve the quality of life for the underprivileged of the world: The Society for Family Health (Nigeria) and the Population Services International (USA). In addition to several Short Term Consultancies for the World Health Organisation, he has served the Federal Republic of Nigeria in several capacities most recently as Chairman of the Health Thematic Group, National Technical Working Groups on Vision 20, 2020 (April – July 2009). In 2005 he received the National Honour; Officer of the Federal Republic (OFR).



Lord Nigel Crisp

Lord Crisp is an independent crossbench member of the House of Lords and works mainly on international development and global health. His book *Turning the world upside down - the search for global health in the 21st Century* published in January 2010, takes the ideas about mutual learning between rich and poor countries and shows how this will shape healthcare in the future. He co-

chaired an international Task Force on increasing the education and training of health workers globally. He was both Chief Executive of the NHS from 2000 to 2008 and Permanent Secretary of the Department of Health and led major reforms in the English health system. A Cambridge philosophy graduate, he joined the NHS in 1986. He is a member of the Health Worker Migratory Advisory Council, a Champion Advocate for the Global Health Workforce Alliance and an Advisory Board Member of the African Centre for Health and Social Development. He also chairs Sightsavers International, is a Senior Fellow at the Institute for Healthcare Improvement in Cambridge Massachusetts, an Honorary Professor at the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine and an Honorary Fellow of St John's College, Cambridge and of the Royal College of Physicians.



Dr. Mohammed Ali Pate

Dr. Muhammad Ali Pate is the Executive Director of the National Primary Health Care Development Agency, Abuja. He is an American Board Certified MD in Internal Medicine and Infectious Diseases, with an MBA (Health Sector Concentration) from Duke University USA. He holds a Masters in Health System Management from the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine UK. Prior to his appointment, Dr

Pate had an extensive career spanning over 16 years at the World Bank, which included serving as the Senior Health Specialist and Human Development Sector Coordinator for the Asia/Pacific Region and also as a Senior Health Specialist for the African Region. Dr Pate is also currently an Adjunct Professor of Global Health of the Duke University Global Health Institute. While at the World Bank, a major project led by Dr Pate was the far-reaching health sector reform programmes in Africa, East Asia and other regions of the World Bank. Of note is his initiation of a Public Private Partnership to replace a National Referral Hospital in Lesotho, Africa. Dr Pate is a humble recipient of numerous awards for excellence including three World Bank Staff leadership Awards; and Merit Awards from the Howard University and American College of Physicians to mention a few.



Mr Dilly Anumba

Dilly graduated from the University of Benin Medical School in Nigeria. Following residency training culminating in his award of the Fellowship of the West African College of Surgeons in Obstetrics and Gynaecology, he moved to the UK in 1991. He rotated through hospitals and was accredited a specialist in Obstetrics and

Gynaecology in 1999, and a subspecialist in Maternal and Fetal Medicine in 2001, when he took up a Consultant post with the Sheffield Teaching Hospital Trust. He combines this with academic and research duties as Senior Clinical Lecturer at the University of Sheffield. Dilly holds a Doctorate in Medicine (Newcastle) and a Masters in Medical Law (Northumbria) and is a Fellow of the Royal College of Obstetricians. Dilly serves on several Specialty Advisory groupings and is a member of the NICE Medical Technologies Advisory Committee. Dilly became the President of the Medical Association of Nigerians Across Great Britain (MANSAG) in October 2009 and is leading a programme of engagement between MANSAG and Nigerian governments and health stakeholders.



Dr. Ugo Okoli

Dr. Ugo Okoli is the Project Adviser/National Programme Consultant to the Midwives Services Scheme of the National Primary Health Care Development Agency. The Midwives Services Scheme; a Federal Government programme which started in 2009, employs midwives to serve in the rural areas of Nigeria with the objective of reducing infant/maternal mortality rate in the country. She obtained

her medical degree from the University of Nigeria in 1981, an MSc in Health Promotion Sciences from the South Bank University London and a Postgraduate Diploma in Clinical Tropical Medicine & Hygiene, as well as an MSc in Public Health from the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine. Her initial clinical work was at the Lagos University Teaching Hospital and the Military Hospital Port Harcourt. In 1990 she took up appointment with National Health Service in the UK and has worked as a public health practitioner, culminating in her last role in the UK as the Director of Public Health at the Enfield Primary Care Trust in London. She is a Fellow of the Faculty of Public Health Medicine and of the Royal Society of Medicine in the UK. Ugo is committed to public health principles and to improving the health and reducing health inequalities.



Dr. Liz Tayler

Dr Liz Tayler works for the UK's Department for International Development (DFID) as the senior health advisor for Africa region. She spent 1999-2003 in Nigeria as health advisor for DFID, and has retained a great interest in the country since then. Liz trained as a doctor at Cambridge and Oxford and spent five years doing general medicine before embarking on a public health training programme. For

some of this period she worked in Oxford, for the rest with WHO on the TB programme in Geneva and with DFID. Following her return from Nigeria Liz worked for HLSP on health in fragile states, and then joined the NHS for five years in Surrey and Sussex as Deputy Director of Public Health/Director of Quality.



Dr Folabi Ogunlesi

Dr. Folabi Ogunlesi heads Vesta Healthcare Partners as Managing Partner/Chief Executive. He graduated from the College of Medicine University of Ibadan and received his training in General and Respiratory Medicine at the Hammersmith, University College Hospital, The Royal London and London Chest Hospital. He was awarded a Doctor of Philosophy (DPhil) degree, by the University of

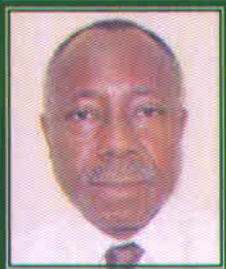
Oxford, whilst studying aspects of the molecular immunology of HIV. He is a member of the British Thoracic Society, the European Respiratory Society and a Fellow of the Royal Society of Medicine. Folabi has extensive experience in medical policy formulation, procurement, consultancy and the interface between healthcare Public-Private Partnerships (PPP). Prior to founding Vesta, he was Managing Director of Huntleigh Healthcare Nigeria Limited, where he grew the business to market leader status and created the first full-service medical equipment manufacturer subsidiary in Nigeria. Folabi also advises governments, corporations and statutory bodies on business aspects of healthcare whilst retaining his practice in London as an NHS Consultant Respiratory Physician with an interest in the diagnosis and treatment of lung cancer.



Dr Seyi Oyesola

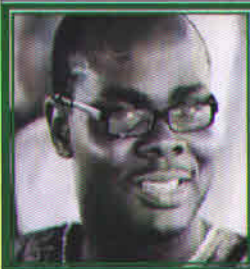
Dr. Seyi Oyesola is a Nigerian trained doctor, inventor and entrepreneur. Basic science and medical education was at the University of Lagos, Nigeria with specialist training in Anaesthesia and Critical Care in the UK and USA. His current practice in the UK is as consultant in Anaesthesia and Intensive Care and Hon. Senior Lecturer & Medical Simulation Instructor at the Imperial College

School of Medicine in London. Other activities include international medical education and training, and medical device design and manufacture. He is also a director of Practice Ventures (UK) a company that specialises in the supply and maintenance of technologically appropriate, specialist medical equipment to African hospitals and hospital management consultancy. He is co-inventor of the Compact Operating Room (CompactOR), a multi-award winning, portable, solar-powered operating theatre system. Between 2008 and 2010 he was the Chief Medical Director of the Delta State University Teaching Hospital in Oghara.



Dr. Ladi Awosika

Dr. Awosika graduated from the University of Lagos in 1974. He co-founded Total Health Trust (THT) in 1997 as a leading privately subscribed network group model HMO in Nigeria and has been involved in the HMO and private health insurance market development in Nigeria since then. THT has international partnerships and affiliations with other health plans and organizations. He is a resource person on health sector reform to Ministry of Health and is a health sector financing consultant. Dr. Awosika is CEO of THT, and of Health Assurance Consultants and on the board of several other health related organisations.



Gbenga Olatunji

Gbenga Olatunji is the Market Development Manager for Johnson & Johnson responsible for the Medical Devices Businesses in West Africa. In that role, he has been responsible for working with hospitals in Nigeria to establish advanced surgical practices, in addition to developing local clinical and management capacity. He is also Franchise Manager of J&J's Ethicon Endo Surgery business across Sub Sahara Africa. Prior to joining J&J, Gbenga worked as a business consultant at PricewaterhouseCoopers and holds an MBA from London Business School.



Dr Agomoh

Dr Agomoh obtained his MBBS from the University of Nigeria in 1982 and Master's in Public Health from the University of Lagos in 1992. He was appointed Fellow of the National Postgraduate Medical College in 1993, after completing a residency programme in Psychiatry at the Psychiatric hospital, Yaba, Lagos. He worked in computing services for Leventis Technical, after obtaining a Diploma in Statistics and Computer Science from Yaba College of Technology Lagos, in 1989. He has served as consultant to USAID- partnered public health projects. He was appointed consultant psychiatrist at the Federal Neuropsychiatric Hospital Enugu Nigeria in 1998, and was head of clinical services and training from 1998 to 2002. He was appointed Medical Director of the institution in 2003, a post he has held to date. He is widely published, and his research interests have centred largely on community mental health development



Gloria Urhoma

Gloria is the Maternity Public Health Development Lead at North West London Hospitals NHS Trust. Her vision is to move the public health agenda into a new dimension in Midwifery practice with a special flair for cultural diversity and its impact on maternal and infant mortality. She is currently working with a team of specialist midwives aiming to change the midwifery culture from interventionist approach into a preventative approach. This will promote safety and contributes to the reduction of maternal/ infant morbidity and mortality.

While working as a Practice Development Midwife at Wexham Park Hospital, she won the Mary Seacole Award in 2008 for a project titled: *'informing the Development of a Maternity information DVD for Pakistani Women: a social marketing approach'*. It was this award that threw more light to the health inequalities many women encounter in the NHS. She is currently undertaking a Doctorate Degree in Clinical Practice with a research focus on women's cultural diversity and maternity services information provision.



Dr T. A Banjoko

Dr T. A Banjoko is a seasoned and gifted change management consultant with a clinical background, who has successfully pioneered, developed and implemented various international developmental projects with successful outcomes at governmental and organisational level. She pioneered the formation of AfricaRecruit a programme designed to build capacity in Africa using human capital as a main driver this led to the formation of both www.findajobinafrica.com and www.africarecruit.com. Dr Banjoko is a member of the Health Worker Global Policy Advisory Council set up by Realizing Rights and the Global Health Workforce Alliance and is a Fellow of the Nigerian Leadership Initiative. Dr Banjoko has received numerous awards such as the 2006 Ethnic – Corporate European Federation of Black Women Business Owners award, Black Business Awards 2005 and Best of Nigeria 2004. She was named by the United Kingdom Independence Newspaper (21st September 2006) as one of the Pride of a continent: Africa's gifts to the world under the Business section. Lola is currently a programme manager for the NHS London, working on the 2012 Olympics.
